In January 2014 Beverley resurrected Presteigne Carnival which ceased almost 20 years before, it turned out to be a huge success and has continued as a wonderful annual community event. Happy that the Carnival was once again established Beverley relinquished her role on the committee.

Beverley is qualified to Level 5 in NVQ's and Level 3 in the Association of Accounting Technicians. She considers herself to be a hardworking, enthusiastic and approachable Councillor.

Leigh has been a resident of Presteigne and Norton since 1996 and has participated in several local initiatives. He was instrumental in Presteigne and Norton becoming the first International Dark Sky Community in England and Wales and continues to promote dark skies within Powys. Leigh volunteers with the charity Caring for God's Acre, as a member of the churchyard task team and regularly helps maintain St. Andrews churchyard in Norton (The Hub) as a wildflower meadow. He has organised bat surveys in the churchyard and has organised bat walks at the Withybeds, with the help of Radnorshire Wildlife Trust, with whom he is a Trustee. He is also a volunteer with Presteigne Carnival and with the Warden Guardians. Leigh is a scientist with a background in environmental management. He hopes that his experience will help make Presteigne and Norton become a more sustainable and environmentally responsible community.

Cllr. Kirkby first joined the Town Councillor in 1987 and has been Mayor on eight occasions. He stood down from the council in 2022 whilst he moved house and was coopted back onto the council in 2024. He has been responsible for a number of hands on projects including the setting up of the Withy Beds nature reserve; the purchase of Lower Wents Meadow - three acres of ground for recreational use by the river Lugg on which the allotments were added; purchase of Silia Woods an important arboretum and backdrop to the community, which was gifted to the Woodland Trust; the setting up and running for 20 years of the Presteigne recycling centre which won 6 National Awards and put over £40,000 back into the community; obtaining grants for and leading the volunteers in the development of the Upper Wents Meadow after purchase by the Town Council, which included the refurbishment of an old barn, a community physic garden, footpath infrastructure, community orchards and the building of a skateboard and mountain bike track. He chaired the steering group and helped raise funding for the Welsh Assembly Funded Zero Waste Project which ran for three years from 2010 and achieved the highest recycling rate at that time in the UK of 74%. In 2013 he acquired an area of ground on the side of the Warden which has been dedicated to Cllr Eddie Taylor MBE and is managed as a hibernaculum. This was followed by persuading Welsh Water to gift the old reservoir on the Warden to the Town.

Other community interests have included being a Retained Fireman for 10 years, a board member of the Presteigne Festival of Music and the Arts for 15 years, Chairman of the Board of Governors at John Beddoes School for 10 years and a member of the Board of Trustees for the Judges Lodging Trust for 10 years and the internal auditor to Stapleton

Group Parish for 15 years. In 2013 he was awarded an MBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours list for services to the Environment and to the Community of Powys (Presteigne).

Reports from Committee Chairs 2024-25

Sites and Buildings Committee: Current Chair Cllr. Fiona Preece.

The Committee meets twice a year to consider matters relating to the Council's property/land in more detail than can happen at Full Council meetings. The Council owns and runs Went's Meadow, Eddie's Meadow, Coed Llanandras Nature Reserve, Allotments and two public toilet blocks.

As a Committee the Council is able to include members of the public by invitation in order to draw on their particular experience. Members of the public are part of the Committee and provide valuable knowledge and assistance with the running of the Council's sites.

Volunteer work days are occasionally organised to carry out maintenance and tidying works on the site. Thank you to everyone who comes to help out on work days.

If you would be interested in helping out on future work days please do get in touch with either myself or the Clerk to the Council and we will make sure we let you know if/when another is planned.

Staffing Committee: Chair - Vacant.

The Council has just one employee, the Town Clerk. All other works are carried out by contractors.

Climate and Environment Committee: Current Chair Cllr. James Ramsay. (Now the Climate & Environment Working Group: Current Chair Cllr. James Ramsay)

This Committee was formed in response to the Council's 2021 Climate Crisis Policy acknowledging the ongoing climate and ecological emergency. The Committee was given a wide remit: in addition to considering how best to promote nature conservation on Council-managed land and other climate-related initiatives, the Committee was "In general to consider the following areas and make recommendations to Full Council - Local resilience, Biodiversity, Local Food Consumption and Waste, Personal Initiatives, Transport and EV Charging, Tree Planting, carbon sequestration, Energy saving and production." In May 2024 the Committee was renamed the Climate and Environment Committee to better reflect its responsibilities and activities. During 2024-2025 the Committee met twice, with a focus on biodiversity topics – hedge management around Went's and Eddie's Meadows, establishment of wildflower areas, management of the nature reserve including signage and support of the volunteers, and biodiversity on verges and roundabouts.

In October 2024 the Committee was dissolved, being replaced by a Climate and Environment Working Group which provides greater flexibility with a lower administrative overhead. Its role is similar – to support Council in implementing the Welsh Environment Act's statutory requirements for all councils to include energy and biodiversity considerations in all decision-making.

ANNUAL ACCOUNTS SUMMARY AND INFORMATION

A major project supported by the Council in recent years has been the creation of the Norton Community Hub. Please see the following pages for a report from the Hub Committee.

NORTON COMMUNITY HUB

Under the supervision of the Presteigne and Norton Community Trust, the project to adapt the former church in Norton as a community Hub was successfully completed and the Hub was officially opened by the High Sheriff of Powys in June 2024.

The Hub began operating in March 2024 and since then has been the venue for a wide range of community shows and events including regular coffee mornings, senior lunches, a book club and knit n' natter group.

The programme of events has been organised by a team of active volunteers, with all the activities being well supported by the local community.

The Hub management committee have also taken responsibility for established village events including the annual Norton Show, the Bonfire and Fireworks event and the annual harvest lunch. This ensures better use of resources and helps to secure the long-term sustainability of the Hub.

Income from events and local donations during the year was £33,000

The management committee has planned a further range of events for the year ahead and has also initiated a project to restore the bell tower clock which will require grant funding.

DARK SKIES PROJECT

In the UK today less than 10% of the population can enjoy a truly dark sky. Light pollution affects health, wildlife and energy consumption.

Following an approach to the Town Council from a local resident the Council has been working with the resident, a lighting designer and the County Council to investigate the possibility of applying for dark sky status for Presteigne and Norton.

The benefits of dark skies are -

To preserve the environment and protect the natural behaviour of nocturnal wildlife.

To enjoy the full experience of our night skies and to see our stars.

To appreciate the character and beauty of the natural landscape.

To protect our health and well-being.

Presteigne and Norton obtained International Dark Sky Community status in January 2024.

In April 2024 Presteigne and Norton Town Council was awarded the One Voice Wales sustainability award for the Presteigne and Norton International Dark Sky Community project.

During the period April 2024 to March 2025 light pollution measurements were undertaken at various sampling points around Presteigne and Norton. Also during this period, "Presteigne Dark Skies" presentations were given to TLT Llandrindod, Talgarth Town Council, PACE climate change and nature conference, Marches Astronomy Group and finally at the Brecon Dark Sky festival in September 2024.

During 2024-25 John Beddoes High School piloted the inclusion of dark sky education into its science curriculum.

At the Presteigne Music Festival in August 2024 the first concert, which showcased Michael Berkeley's World premiere "Morning Star", was dedicated to Presteigne being certified as the first International Dark Sky Community in Wales.

Presteigne and Norton is the first such International Dark Sky Community in Wales and England.

NATURE RESERVE

Coed Llanandras – Presteigne's Community Woodland Nature Reserve



The new 3.4 ha (8.4 acres) nature reserve was established in 2023 following purchase of the site by the Council in November 2022 thanks to a grant from the Welsh Government's Woodland Creation Fund¹. Formerly pasture with some specimen 19th Century trees, and partly designated as Historic Park and Garden by Cadw, the site, between the Warden and the Primary School, is developing into a variety of habitats including grassland, broadleaved woodland and wetlands, as well as a small community orchard. The reserve has educational and recreational purposes as well as ecological, is part of the National Forest for Wales, and is becoming a much-loved local resource.

Management is carried out by volunteers with a small budget from the Council and grants from various sources. The principal tasks in 2023 were constructing the entrance gateway and

access path, planting some 2000 trees and building two ponds. Activities from April 2024 to April 2025 included mowing and seeding of wildflower areas, dock and thistle removal, building a hibernaculum for slow worms by the local Squirrels (4-6 year old Scouts), construction of an insect hotel by children from the adjacent Primary School and another by other visiting children, planting wetland plants around the upper pond, weekly butterfly monitoring and regular path mowing. A special event was the Community Engagement and Bioblitz Day on 25 May, led by an experienced wildlife biologist, Tim Kaye.

Grants were received from Powys Nature Partnership's Nature Recovery in Your Community Fund, and were used to purchase wetland plants, hand tools, and additional trees.

There are two ponds on the reserve. Since the original excavations did not hold water, in October 2023 remaining grant funds were used to enlarge both ponds and line them with bentonite clay, an inert waterproofing material. This proved effective over the 2024 summer, which was cool and wet. 2025 is likely to be more challenging, due to the lack of rain and high temperatures. Nevertheless, the ponds have attracted a variety of waterbirds and are making a significant contribution to the reserve's biodiversity.





TOWN WIFI

In July 2021 the Town Council was approached by the County Council to establish its interest in providing free wifi in the town centre.

Thanks is due to the following for continuing to site the units –

The Salty Dog

The Old School (Presteigne Youth Project)

The Royal Oak

Powys County Council - Assembly Rooms

In addition to providing the free wifi the system provides visitor data (numbers/length of stay etc) which can be supplied to businesses and used to provide supporting information for grant applications etc.

The system is up and running and available for use for both residents and visitors when out and about in the town.





HIGH STREET GRANT PROJECT

During 2024/25 working in partnership with the County Council and various High Street businesses the Town Council has applied for and received a total grant of just under £50,000 to enable businesses in the centre of town to improve and renovate their shop fronts. Businesses needed to provide an element of match funding and submit three quotes for the proposed works.

Thanks are due to everyone involved for their work and the project. The various properties look really smart.

ALLOTMENTS

The Council applied for a small grant for the allotment site to provide two raised beds on one of the smaller plots and a picnic bench to have on the site. After some delay in the funding being awarded and then spent these were installed recently.

UPCOMING PROJECTS

For 2025-26 the Council has two main projects going forward and these are -

Community Storage Building: Grant funding of £20,000 was secured from the lottery in early 2025 together with pledged donations/commitments from the Town Council itself (£3000), Presteigne Carnival £1000 and Sheep Music £1000. Work commenced in April 2025 and the building is now almost complete.

Access Paths, Went's Meadow: In the Autumn of 2025 the Council applied for a grant from the Brilliant Basics Fund to improve access for all on the Went's Meadow site. Existing paths will be improved and their width increased and some new paths will be added. This will enable easier and better access to those less physically able, particularly those using wheelchairs, mobility scooters and of course also for pushchair/pram users. Expected to start in August 2025 this project will improve access for visitors across the site, particularly at times of events on the Meadow.
